


CAMERA MAN IN CHINA STRIPPED; SAVES FILM

Held Up Six Times by Chinese, Once by Japanese on Trek

CANTON, China, Oct. 30 (A).— Associated Press photographer Karl J. Eskelund has pictures of the Japanese entry into Canton. He has not got his clothes and his camera is gone, but he has the pic-

Mr. Eskelund walked the rails back to Canton today almost stripped. He had tried to follow the tracks of the Canton-Kowloon railroad afoot to Hong Kong, but Chinese bandits robbed him of his clothes and camera. He saved his film and fled.

When he arrived here he was held by Japanese officials for three hours until the Danish consulate

arranged his release.

Mr. Eskelund said he had been held up six times by Chinese and once by Japanese, "who shot a flag
